



Ogouchi Dam

While the dam serves as a reservoir, it also has a beautiful lake view and is also famous for its impressive water discharges, making it a popular tourism spot. There is also a floating "barrel drum bridge" that visitors can walk along.

Standing quietly deep in the mountains, these concrete structures are grand as they are otherworldly. The impressive sight of water discharges attracts an increasing number of "dam maniacs" .

The Ogouchi Dam and Shiromaru Regulating Reservoir Dam are popular spots in the Tama region where visitors can experience the feeling of exploring the mountains. Since the early Edo period, the upper stream of the Tama River has been an important source of water for the people of Tokyo, and today these dams stand to serve the same purpose.

Among the many weirs in Tokyo Tama, the Hamura Intake Weir is the most famous. It was constructed around 360 years ago, and it has been supplying water to the people of Tokyo ever since.
